

BACK to basics SCULPTING OVAL NAILS



This workbook will teach you how to sculpt an oval nail shape in the salon. You will learn proper form placement, attention to creating beads and placing the liquid & powder beads, as well as special filing techniques to create a perfectly even oval nail.

WHAT YOU NEED

Dappen dish, lint-free wipes, monomer, pink powder, brush, 150/180-grit file

GETTING PREPARED

Fill the dappen dish with monomer. Make sure the liquid is deep enough to submerge the entire bristles of the brush. Place a lint-free wipe beside the dappen dish so you can clean your brush before you start.

Place your chosen color powder beside the dappen dish.




PREPARING YOUR BRUSH

To prepare the brush, dip the bristles in the liquid monomer. Wipe the brush on the side of the dappen dish and then wipe the brush in one direction only, on the lint-free wipe.



Prep the nail as shown in detail in *Back to Basics* Season 1.



Take the form, pull off its sticker and place it on the back to make it sturdier. Roll the form between your fingers to make it easier to apply to the finger.



Place the form on the finger.
Slide it under the free edge between the hyponychium and the nail plate.

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Notice the gap that is seen to the right hand side of the free edge. This means the form needs to be customized.



Customize the nail form with your nail nippers.



The customized form now gives a perfect fit to the nail. Squeeze the bottom tabs together to close the form around the finger.



With a customized nail form, you may have small gaps at the free edge but larger gaps may cause seepage under the nail. If the gap is too large, remove and start again with a new form.




For an oval shaped nail, tighten up the form at the end, but make sure you leave a hole that will create the correct sized -curve. Ensure the form is secure on the finger.




Put the brush into the monomer liquid. Half wipe it on the side of the dappen dish, then turn the brush and place it in the powder. Pick up your bead and wait until it gets creamy. Place the bead in the center of the nail where you want your apex to be.









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Keep the bulk of the product at the center of the nail while keeping it thin at the sides and the free edge. The apex is where the thickest part of the product will be.



If the free edge of the nail is too thin, add a small bead at the tip and blend it backwards.



Blend the product and shape as you sculpt. The oval nail is easy to sculpt on this form, as the lines are oval and the product just needs to follow the line. Leave a slight point with a nice rounded edge as you sculpt.



Add your final small bead at the cuticle area. Place the bead in the upper section in the middle of the nail and blend it in.



Tap the product with the brush to gently get it up to the cuticle area of the nail. Then blend it down the nail with long strokes. Work softly, do not press hard on the product. Keep the brush parallel and add any further beads that are required to complete the nail.



As the L&P dries use your thumbs to mold and roll the sides of the nail. You will feel it become hard as the nail begins to pop out of the form.



Remove the form.



Use a C-curve stick to mold the C-curve as the L&P nail sets.



Keep your elbows out as you roll down the nail with your thumbs. Press in at the smile line, to create a straight but tapered line from the cuticle to the free edge.




Use the heat from your fingers to lock in the shape of the nail at the smile line area as it cures.



Now take a smaller (one-size down) C-curve stick and wrap the nail around it. This will give a softer look to the nail. Tighten and taper the nail as it cures; leave the tip rounded.

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Start filing the sides with a 150-grit file. Hold the file straight and file down from the cutice line.



Angle the file slightly to create the tapered end.





Hold the top of the nail to steady it and file the free edge at a 45-degree angle to refine the oval shape. Then file the side grooves to blend into the oval shape.



Refine the whole nail shape.
Move to the top of the nail with a 180-grit file to get rid of the bulk of the product. Work gently, let the grit do the work. Seal the cuticle and buff smooth. Polish with your desired shade.



In this workbook you have learned how to fit a nail form in order to sculpt an oval nail. The steps have guided through correctly applying a nail form, application of the L&P bead, to shaping and placement before pinching with thumbs to refine the sidewalls and pinching in the C-curve. Filing to refine the nail is then covered to reveal a fully formed oval nail shape.
